Question for Dr. Zollars

This letter was sent to us by Joseph Liska to forward to Dr. Zollars. I have a 1989 blue lace Satinette hen that is a good show bird but also my particular pet. She has always enjoyed perfect health and has been in perfect condition. I only keep six hens, (not over crowded), use good feed, Vita-Preen three times a week and Feed Mate 85 in between. A little I Odine in the water once a week. Several weeks ago she developed what may be a tumor. She is squatting down, where she formerly stood very erect, with her back hunched as if she were about to lay an egg. Underneath near her vent she is very swollen, almost the size of a small tennis ball and the area is discolored - sort of a bruised, purpleish appearance. She has maintained her weight and her droppings are a little watery but parctically formed. I've tried giving her Sulmet, and Aureomycin but none of this has seemed to improve her condition. I would like to cure her if at all possible. Dr. Zollars' answer to Mr. Liska was sent to him and has also been published on page 11 of this issue.
